What is Tiger Balm Soft used for

Provides symptomatic relief of muscular aches, pains and strains.

How does Tiger Balm Soft work

It has mild warm soothing, analgesic and local anesthetic effects. When massaged gently on the skin, it produces a cooling effect followed by a sensation of warmth which may last for a period of up to several hours.

Before you use Tiger Balm Soft

When you must not use it

Individual with known or suspected intolerance to any ingredients of the medicine.

Before you start to use it

It may cause allergic reaction in some individuals with sensitive skin. Before you start using it, test on small area first.

-Taking other medicines

Not Applicable. Topical use only, no interaction with oral drugs.

How to use Tiger Balm Soft

-How much to use

Use only sufficient amount on the affected area.

-When to use it

Use it when you are suffering from muscular aches, pains and strains.

-How long or often to use it

Recommended to use few times daily.

-If you forget to use it

Consult your doctor on what you should do if you forgot to use it. You may continue to experience symptomatic discomforts listed.

-If you use too much (overdose)

If you think you or anyone else may have used too much of this medicine or accidental ingestion occurs, consult a doctor immediately or go to the Emergency Department of nearest hospital. Do this even if there are no sign of discomfort or poisoning. You may need medical attention.

While you are using Tiger Balm Soft

-Things you must do

Apply on affected area gently until completely absorbed. Pregnant women and nursing women to consult a doctor before use.

-Things you must not do

- Do not apply *Tiger Balm Soft* on wounds or irritated skin.
- Do not bandage tightly.
- Camphor can cause convulsion.
 Do not use on infants below 2 years of age. (Contraindication).

Things to be careful of

- Individuals with known or suspected intolerance to warm soothing should exercise cautions in using this preparation. (Contraindication)
- For pregnant women and nursing mothers, consult a physician before use.
- Caution must be taken when older children are treated.

- Avoid direct contact with nostrils, eyes, mucous membranes or other tender body area.
- Discontinue use if excessive irritation of the skin develops.
- For external use only. Keep away from children.

Side effects
