SALOSONE OINTMENT

Betamethasone dipropionate/salicylic acid (0.05% w/w / 3% w/w)

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What Salosone is used for

It is used for relief of seborrheic dermatitis, fish scale disease, psoriasis and other inflammatory, steroid-responsive skin diseases, thick, dry, scaling skin conditions.

How Salosone works

Salosone contains betamethasone dipropionate and salicylic acid. Betamethasone dipropionate is a steroid applied topically in the management of various disorders where steroid is needed. It has anti-inflammatory and anti-itch effects. Salicylic acid has skin shedding, anti-bacteria and anti-fungus actions.

Before you use Salosone

- When you must not use it If allergic to betamethasone dipropionate, salicylic acid or other ingredients of

Salosone.

- Before you start to use it

- Suitable precautions should be taken if applied over large areas, particularly on broken skin, with or without dressings.
- Special precautions have to be observed when used on infants and children as it may cause growth retardation on prolonged use.
- Use should be discontinued if excessive dryness, irritation or sensitization of the skin occurs.
- Avoid contact with the eyes and mucous membranes. Avoid prolonged use on the face.

- Taking other medicines

Check with doctor or pharmacist if using any medication.

How to use Salosone

- How much to use

Medication applied over affected skin twice daily.

- When to use it

Always use *Salosone* exactly as your doctor has instructed you. You should check with your doctor or pharmacist if you are unsure.

- How long to use it

You should check with your doctor or pharmacist.

- If you forget to use it

Apply as soon as you remember.

- If you use too much (overdose)

doctor, an emergency department or a poison center immediately. Excessive or prolonged use of locally applied steroids can suppress pituitary-adrenal function, resulting in adrenal insufficiency, and causes hypercoticism, (high levels of hormone cortisone) including Cushing s disease. Prolonged use of salicylic acid causes salicylism (salicylic acid poisoning).

While you are using Salosone

- Things you must do

Inform doctor of medications you are taking.

- Things you must not do

Never give this medicine to someone else, it could harm them, even if their symptoms seem the same.

- Things to be careful of

If you are pregnant or become pregnant or breast-feeding during treatment, you should not use *Salosone* unless your doctor tells you to. Your doctor will consider about the potential benefits and risks of your therapy to you and your child.

Side effects

When applied topically, particularly to large areas or when the skin is broken or under dressings, betamethasone dipropionate may be absorbed in sufficient amounts to cause burning, itching, irritation, acne-like conditions, loss of skin colour, rash of red bumps around the mouth, allergic skin inflammation, excessive hair disorder and inflammation of hair follicles.

Storage and disposal of Salosone

- Storage

Store in cool, dry place below 30°C. Protect from light. Keep out of reach of children.

Ask your pharmacist how to dispose of medicines no longer required.
