Gliclazide 80mg

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What DIAMICRON is used for

DIAMICRON is used in a certain form of diabetes (type 2 diabetes mellitus) in adults, when diet, exercise and weight loss alone do not have an adequate effect on keeping blood sugar at the correct level.

How DIAMICRON works

DIAMICRON is a medicine that reduces blood sugar levels (oral antidiabetic medicine belonging to the sulfonylurea group).

Before you use DIAMICRON

- When you must not use it

Do not take DIAMICRON:

- if you are allergic to gliclazide, to other sulfonylureas or sulfonamides or to one of excipients included,
- if you have diabetes requiring treatment with insulin,

- in case of diabetes complicated by ketoacidosis, diabetic precoma,
- if you suffer from severe liver or kidney disease,
- if you are presently taking a treatment with miconazole (Refer to "Taking other medicines"),
- if you are breast-feeding.

Pregnancy and breastfeeding

If you are pregnant, your diabetes should be treated with insulin.

If you discover that you are

pregnant while taking this medication, you should discontinue your treatment.

Tell your doctor, who will adjust

your hypoglycaemic treatment. This medication is contraindicated when breast-feeding.

Ask your doctor or your pharmacist for advice before taking any medicine.

- Before you start to use it

Warnings

<u>Hypoglycaemia</u>: (decrease in blood sugar levels)

You may suffer from hypoglycaemia in the course of your treatment. If this happens, it may be necessary to hospitalise you to restore your sugar levels. After a hypoglycaemic episode, your doctor will monitor you closely for at least 24 hours.

The following information is necessary to avoid episodes of hypoglycaemia:

 it is important to eat regular meals, including breakfast, due to the increased risk of

- hypoglycaemia if a meal is missed, or in the case of an inadequate diet or a diet low in sugars,
- age, renal insufficiency, hepatic insufficiency and certain disorders of the adrenal glands or the pituitary gland may increase the risk of hypoglycaemia,
- the risk of hypoglycaemia is heightened by the following: a diet which is too strict or poorly balanced, considerable or prolonged exertion, consumption of alcohol or combination treatment with other hypoglycaemic medications (Refer to "Taking other medicines").

<u>Glycaemic imbalance</u>:

In the case of surgery, trauma, fever or infection, your doctor may discontinue this treatment and prescribe insulin for you.

Biological analyses:

The levels of glucose in your blood and urine should be monitored regularly.

Due to the presence of lactose, this drug should not be used in the case of congenital galactosemia, the syndrome of malabsorption of glucose and galactose or a deficit in lactase (rare metabolic diseases).

Precautions

Your doctor will explain to you and your family how to avoid hypoglycaemia, how to recognise the first symptoms and how to treat them.

Your doctor will also explain the conditions under which you may become resistant to the treatment with gliclazide: other medications may then be prescribed as a replacement.

- Taking other medicines

Please inform your doctor or pharmacist if you are taking or have taken any other medicines even if it is a medicine that can be obtained without a prescription:

- 1. Medications which risk increasing the hypoglycaemia: miconazole, phenylbutazone, betablockers, fluconazole, angiotensin converting enzyme inhibitors, medications containing alcohol.
- 2. Medications which risk producing hyperglycaemia by reducing the efficacy of the anti-diabetic agent: danazol, chlorpromazine, glucocorticoids, salbutamol, terbutaline, ritodrine.

How to use DIAMICRON

Oral use.

Swallow the whole tablet(s). Do not chew or crush.

- How much to use

Always take DIAMICRON exactly as your doctor has told you. You should check with your doctor or pharmacist if you are not sure.

The standard dosage is 2 tablets per day, in 2 daily doses. This depends on the response to treatment.

Please talk to your doctor or pharmacist if you have the impression that DIAMICRON is acting too strongly or not strongly enough.

- When to use it

Use as directed by your doctor or pharmacists.

Take your tablet(s) with a glass of water at breakfast time (and preferably at the same time each day).

You must always eat a meal after taking your tablet(s).

- How long to use it

Continue taking DIAMICRON for as long as your doctor recommends.

- If you forget to use it

It is important to take your medicine every day as regular treatment works better.

However, if you forget to take a dose of DIAMICRON, take one tablet with the next meal. Do not take a double dose to compensate the simple dose you have forgotten to take.

- <u>If you use too much (overdose)</u>

Contact your doctor immediately or go to the Emergency Department of your nearest hospital, if you think you or anyone else may have taken too much of this medicine. Do this even if there are no signs of discomfort or poisoning. You may need urgent medical attention.

If you experience mild signs of hypoglycaemia: weakness, sweating, intense hunger, trembling, drowsiness, dizziness, headache, visual problems, eat or drink something containing sugar.

Consult your doctor or your pharmacist immediately.

While you are using it

- Things you must do

Take your medicine exactly as your doctor has told you.

Tell all the doctors, dentists and phamacists treating you that you are taking DIAMICRON.

Tell your doctor immediately if you become pregnant while taking this medication.

- Things you must not do

Do not stop taking the medicine unless advised by your doctor.

Do not take any new medicines without consulting your doctor.

Do not give DIAMICRON to anyone else, even if they have the same symptoms or condition as you.

- Things to be careful of

Driving and using machines

This medicine may affect your ability to drive or use machines. If the tablets make you feel sick, dizzy or tired, or give you a headache, do not drive or use machines and contact your doctor immediately.

Side Effects

As with all active substances, this medication may produce distressing effects of varying severity in some people :

- hypoglycaemia (Please refer to 'Warnings' and 'overdosage'),
- skin reactions: urticaria, itching, skin rash,

- gastrointestinal disorders: nausea, diarrhoea, stomach problems, constipation, jaundice, hepatitis,
- abnormal laboratory results affecting the blood, liver and kidney functions.

If you notice undesirable effects which have not been mentioned in this package insert, please inform your doctor or your pharmacist.

Storage and Disposal of DIAMICRON

- Storage

Keep out of the reach and sight of children.

Do not use DIAMICRON after the expiry date which is stated on the carton and the blister strip. The expiry date refers to the last day of that month.

Do not use DIAMICRON if you note signs of deterioration on the packaging or on blisters.

Store below 30°C.

- Disposal

Medicines should not be disposed of via wastewater or household waste. Ask your pharmacist how to dispose of medicines no longer required. These measures will help to protect the environment.

The scored tablets are available in boxes of 20 and 60 tablets.
